James J. Yee is a former member of the United States Army and West Point graduate who served as the Muslim Chaplain for the U.S. prison camp at Guantánamo Bay. After objecting to the degrading prisoner abuses, Yee was arrested and imprisoned in 2003 for 76 days, accused of spying, espionage and aiding the alleged Taliban and Al-Qaeda prisoners. All charges were dropped after months of government investigation. Though reinstated to full duty, Yee tendered his resignation and now speaks about his harrowing ordeal and the challenges of protecting both national security and civil liberties.
